## Research With Respect



Our guest speaker on Tuesday was Pat Maddochs who provided a most informative overview of how Phase I Critical Trial Volunteers are treated by the research community in Canada and the steps that

Research With Respect [www.researchwithrespect.ca](http://www.researchwithrespect.ca) has taken to ease the burden placed on those who volunteer for those trials. The organization's goals are: To inform the public of the noble contributions made by these volunteers to society; To improve subject monitoring throughout the trial; To provide free, independent consultations with qualified nurses; and To promote the goal of providing compassionate end-of-life care. Pat's late husband Dave was diagnosed with a terminal cancer and passed away in 2005. During the last part of his life Dave became a Phase I Clinical Trial Volunteer and underwent the testing in Vancouver. Pat underscored the insensitive conditions placed upon him and others during the trial period, which involved taking doses of the trial drugs, providing blood samples for analysis; several in a short period but without any monitoring of his health or condition by those conducting the trial. Pat further informed us that Canada is one of the countries in the world without a Public Clinical Trial Registry that scientists could reference to determine if other trials involving the same or similar drugs have been conducted before launching into a duplicate and expensive trial. She encouraged us to sign and mail a letter to the Minister of Health asking her to create such a registry. Sorry, Pat's photo was not available at time of publication—Ed.

## Rotary Moment



### Foundation Announces Goals for 2009-10 - By Arnold R. Grahl

Foundation Trustee Chair-elect Glenn E. Estess Sr. outlined the Foundation's 2009-10 goals at the International Assembly. Rotary Image/ Alyce Henson

The year ahead will be a pivotal time for The Rotary Foundation, as it embarks on a second century of Rotary service, and faces the changes coming in the Future Vision Plan. Foundation Trustee Chair-elect Glenn E. Estess Sr. implored Rotarians, and specifically the incoming district governors gathered for the International Assembly, to rise and meet the challenge, to keep Rotary's promises for generations to come. "In Rotary, we can do good in so many ways because there are over 1.2 million of us," Estess said during a plenary session on Wednesday. "We can do good in so many places because we are in over 200 countries and geographical areas. And we can do so much good that changes the world because we have the strength of our Rotary Foundation behind us."

The 2009-10 Foundation goals are:

1. Keep the promise to eradicate polio

Estess said the No. 1 priority remains the promise to eradicate polio.

"The race to finish polio has been a long race, more of a marathon than a sprint," he said. "But in any race, when you get to the end, when you see that finish line up ahead -- still a little ways up the road, but well in sight -- it is always natural to want to run a little faster and a little harder." Estess noted that the six areas of focus in the Future Vision Plan echo the priorities set by RI President-elect John Kenny in his RI theme

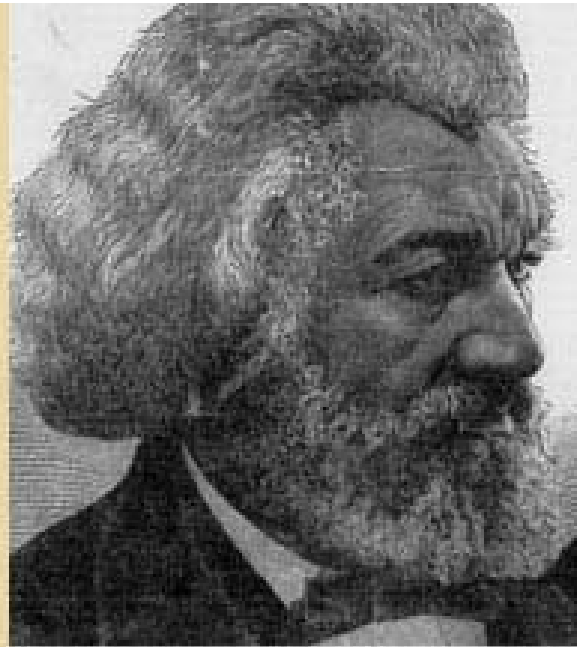
